CHENEY VICTORIOUS Lost Only Girls Doubles.

Preliminary tennis practice ended Friday April 17 with a meet with Sprague High School. The Cheney Boys had little difficulty in winning their matches in straight sets, while Sprague's victory in the girls' doubles gave them the only win of the day. Harold West, Cheney's young star won from Joe Brislawn 6-0; 6-4 in the first match. Verne and Adelia Bacharach then took the court for the second match and played a spectacular game winning from Sprague's mixed doubles team 6-4; 6-0. Helen Hertrick and Edna Salt then won their doubles match from Vivian Harmon and Lily Fry 6-0, 6-0. In the boys' doubles match Virgil McGee and Fred West easily disposed of Sprague's team 6-3; 6-2. The girls' singles match was called off on account of rain in the first set.

This week will determine the school champions with the end of the tournament on Friday. The draw for the tournament was made Monday, as follows: Fred West vs Nolan Brown, Harold West vs McGee, Womach vs Huse, V. Bacharach vs winner of preliminary. Adelia Bacharach vs Josephine Moore Lucille Bowers vs Nora Baker, Elizabeth Kingston vs Lilly Pryor, Tiny Leidloff vs Vivian Harmon. The Boys' preliminaries include Noel Guertin, Rudolph Kuster, Don Erickson and Richard Hungate.

The school tournament will be made an annual affair each year at the end of the preliminary practice. John W. Graham and Co. will give a cup to the boys' single champion while the high school tennis club will give a gold Eversharp pencil to the girls' winner and a racket cover to the girls' second ranking player and six tennis balls to the boys' second ranking player.

School tennis meets have been scheduled with the following schools Lewis & Clark April 24, North Central or Millwood, May 1. Spokane County meet, May 8-9. A meet May be held with Gonzaga High School sometime in May.

C. H. S. WINS MEET Score was 68 1/3 to 68 2/3.

Cheney High School Track Squad came out ahead in the meet with Sprague last Saturday by the narrowest margin of any meet in recent years. The final count was 68 2/3 to 68 1/3 in Cheney's favor. In the first half of the meet a lead of 17 points was piled up by Sprague. The fine work of Ames in the 880 and the mile kept this from increasing. Beginning with the high jump, Cheney whittled down her opponent's lead with Wilson, Coe, and Sargeant doing well in the discus and broad jump. The relay found Cheney four and two-thirds measures behind and offered the only chance for a win. Sprague ran her best man against Wilson and in the first 220, secured a comfortable margin. Coe cut this down fifteen feet and Ames gained 30 feet on his opponent. Sargeant duplicated the work of Wynstra at Hillyard last year. He started 15 feet behind his man, ran outside him on the turn for another 3 yards, sprinting, in what was probably the fastest fifty of the day, to a win of only inches in the relay and a hair breadth victory in the meet.

Individual points: Sargeant 22 1/4, Ames 11 7/12, Wilson 10 3/4, Coe 6 3/4, Easton 6 1/4, Phillips 4, Sanger 2 1/2, Erickson 2 1/3, Conley and Simpson each one.

The definite final results can not be announced until the 220 and the relay are held. The Seniors lead with 57 1/2 points, the Sophomores are second with 48 1/2 points, and the Juniors are third with 44 points. Although Seniors are now in the lead, the Sophomores stand a good chance of winning, and the Juniors can win second place if they win the 220 and the relay.

The high point man of the meet is Vernon Sargeant, who has 37 4/10 points. This honor is closely contested by Arthur Ames who has 28 5/10 points. Sargeant and Ames will receive the high point ribbons. Third honor fourth, and fifth place, maybe won in any order as there is little difference in score as now held by Easton, Erickson
