FOUR FACULTY MEMBERS LEAVING

Miss Lousia Martin to
Succeed Miss Elward

Several changes will be made in the faculty for next year, especially in the Junior High School.

Those who are leaving are: Miss Kathryn Elward, of the Music Department, Mr. L. W. Gellerman, of the History Department, Mr. Omer O. Pence, principal of the Junior High School, and Miss Anne Leverman, substitute of the Junior High School.

Miss Lousia Martin from Moscow, Idaho, will take Miss Elward's place, but none of the other vacancies have yet been filled. Miss Elward plans to teach in the East, while Miss Leverman has been elected to the Portland schools, Mr. Pence will teach in the Training School as critic in the upper grades. Mr. Gellerman plans to teach on the West side.

Mr. Lindley, who is now attending Cornell University, will return and take up his post as superintendent next fall. Mr. Hodge will resume his duties as principal of the Junior High School.

DINNER ATTRACTS LARGE CROWD

CHENEY WINS TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

Adelia & Verne Bacharach Stars

For the first time in five years, the Cheney High School tennis team took the Spokane County Tennis Championship. The meet was held in Spokane last Friday and Saturday, May 8-9. West Valley High School of Millwood, last year's champion, took second with two matches to Cheney's three. Verne Bacharach won the Boy's Singles Championship of the County rather easily defeating players from Hillyard, Vera, and Millwood; the sets being, 6-1, 6-2; 6-0, 6-1; 6-0, 6-4; respectively. The Boy's Doubles were won by Virgil McGee and Harold West by defeating Eagan and Hollister from Millwood in spectacular finals, 6-4, 10-8. They also defeated players from Milan and Vera. This victory for Cheney tied the local players with Millwood with 2 matches each when Verne and Adelia Bacharach won the Mixed Doubles Championship from Richland 6-3, 3-6, 6-3. Adelia Bacharach won from Vera in Girl's Singles in the first round of the tournament but forfeited to Walker of Hillyard in the semi-finals. The past season was very successful for the local team. Meets were held with Lewis and Clark, North Central, Gonzaga, Sprague, and Millwood. The High School team also won the County Championship trophy, a large loving cup.

TRACK

Cheney finished second in the county meet held at Hillyard on May 2. The score was as follows: Hillyard 66, Cheney 46, Millwood 28, Vera 7, Richland 4, others 8. Sargeant took the only two firsts for Cheney when he jumped 19'9 in the Broad Jump and did the 220 in 23.4 in front of a fast field. Four men from Cheney qualified for the District Meet and two, Sargeant and Erickson, will go to the State Meet this week-end.

Wenatchee wins the State meet at Pullman. Two stars from the Blossom City will go to Chicago for the National meet.

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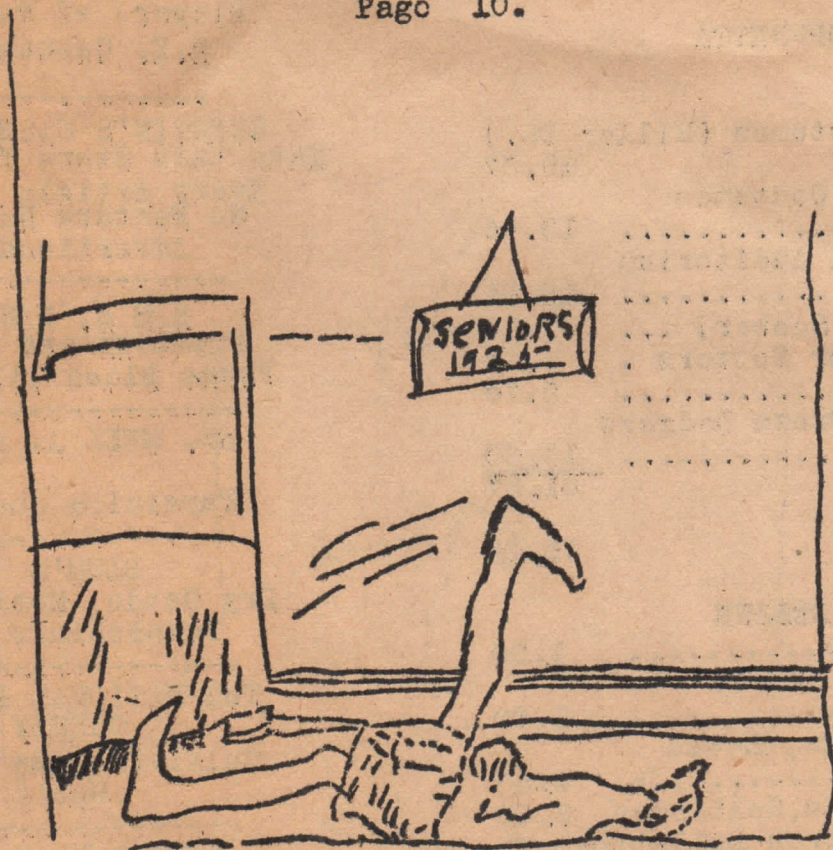
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
