SPLENDID ART EXHIBIT IS COMING TO HIGH SCHOOL

Works of Great Masters Will Be Shown .- Picture Studies Accompany Pictures.

The picture exhibit, which will be shown in the home economcis rooms of the high school on January 21, 22, and 23, will give the art lovers of Cheney an opportunity to study the works of the great masters, such as Raphael, Rembrandt, Millet, St. Gaudens, and Michael Angelo. Among the masterpieses will be the Acropolis, Westminster Abby, The Gleaners, The Sistine Madonna, Sir Galahad, and Washington Crossing the Delaware.

The exhibit includes over 600 pictures, of all sizes. Picture studies accompany many of the pictures so one can spend many hours acquainting himself with the works of the most famous artists.

A fee of 25 cents will be charged to cover the expense of shipping. The hours that the exhibit is to be open will be announced later.

RETURNS VICTORIOUS

Leaving Cheney on the morning of January 1, the local boys invaded the neighboring state of Idaho and won from the Idaho state runners-up, winners of the Normal tournament, and north Idaho champions. Undefeated for four years in their section, the Kellogg high veterans were played off their feet and defeated, 10-8 in the fastest game ever witnessed in Kellogg. The inability of the Chenev boys to shoot baskets kept the score from being much larger. The guarding of both teams was exceptional. The score at the end of the first half was 6-4 in favor of Cheney. Neither team scored in the third period. In the fourth period West caged a long one, which was followed by another by Bacharach, and Cheney was safely in the lead, 10-6. The time nearly gone, both teams were fighting desperately when Hul caged the longest shot of the evening, making the final score 10-8. West of Cheney starred, counting six of Cheney's 10 points.

The following evening the Cheney boys defeated the Mullan high school, 21-8, in a slow game. The lineup in the first half was Bacharach and Erickson, forwards; Huse, center; McGee and Burke, guards. West and Coe got into action in the last period. The local boys did not get going until the last period, when they counted 11 points. Bacharach, Huse and Erickson garnered most of Cheey's points.

Saturday night, January the Cheney boys met the fast Ellogg Eagles and were defeated, 30-1. The Eagles team, composed of excollegiate and high school stars, wo were faster and larger, won fim the smaller high school boys without great difficulty. The high school quintet defeated the Spangle five Friday evening in their second conference game of the season by a 24-13 score. The game was played in the Normal gym. A. A. Eustis refereed.

The local boys seemed unable to get under way during the first half, but came back in the second period with some pretty passing that ended in many baskets. Captain Mike Barke and Coe guarded well, allowing but one basket, at close range. The Cheney offense of Huse, West and Bacharach looked good during the last half. Bacharach was high point man with 12. Burns starred for the losers, counting 11 points. The following men were included in the Cheney lineup: Fred West, Bacharach, Harold West, Fishback, forwards; Huse, center; Burke, Coe and McGee, guards.

Fifty-seven students belong to the Students' Association and have paid \$2.25 each at the beginning of the year. Fifty per cent of this was applied to football expenses at the end of the football season.

FARM, SHOP CLASS MAKES GOOD PROGRESS

The farm shop class is advancing rapidly. They have already conquered the figuring of studding and sheating and have proceeded into concrete work.

The boys are now busy making forms. Two types of fence posts will be made: the triangular and the square. Six or eight different types of building blocks are planned. Experiments will be made in coloring and reenforcing concrete, and slump tests will be performed.

Flower pots are predominant in the choice of individual projects, many of the students did not realize what difficulties awaited them in the cutting and assembling of the forms, or they probably would have chosen other projects.

As a class problem, Mr. Burns has selected the laying of a foundation for a house. At the same time the class will also get actual experience in cutting rafters. This project will be undertaken in the spring.
